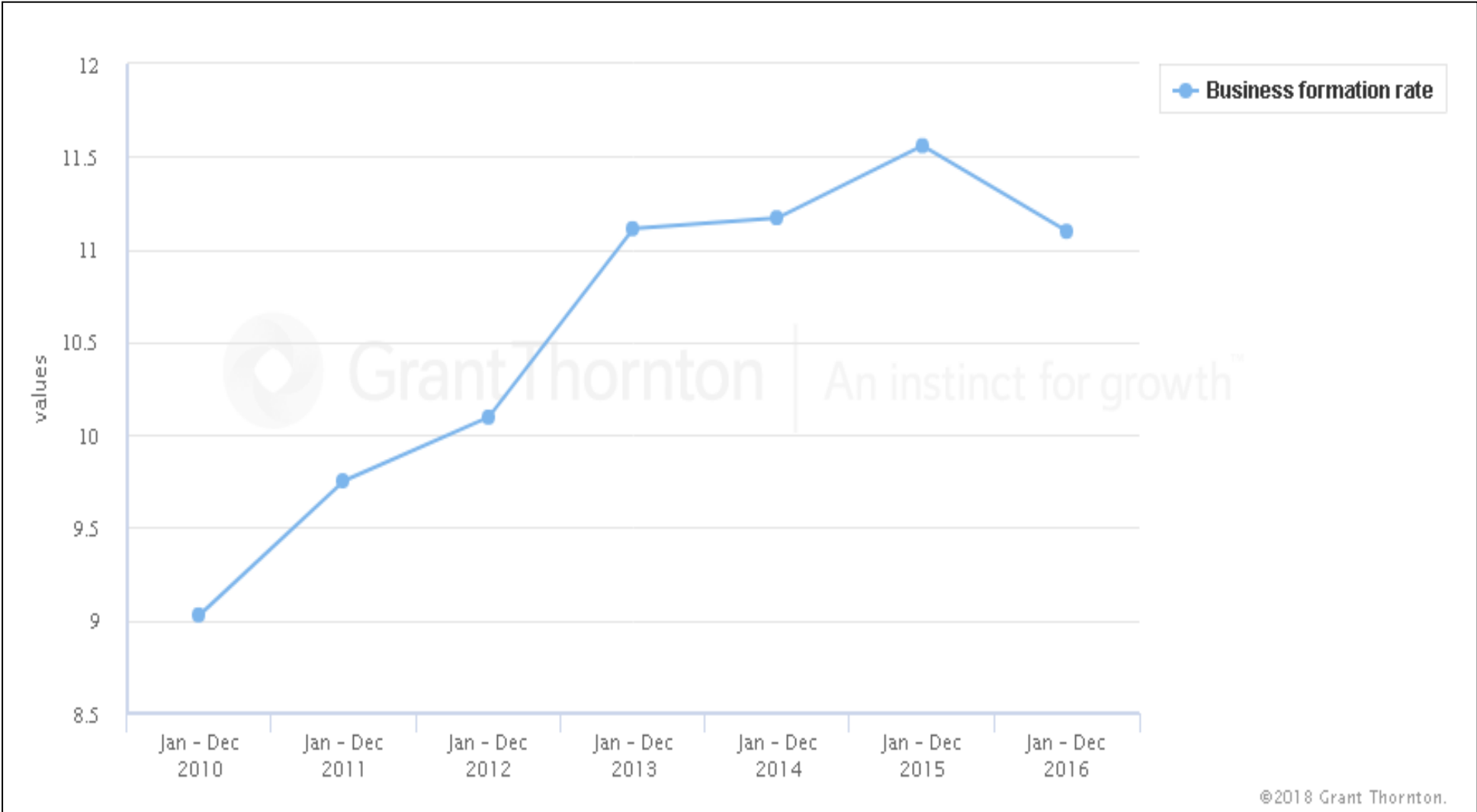




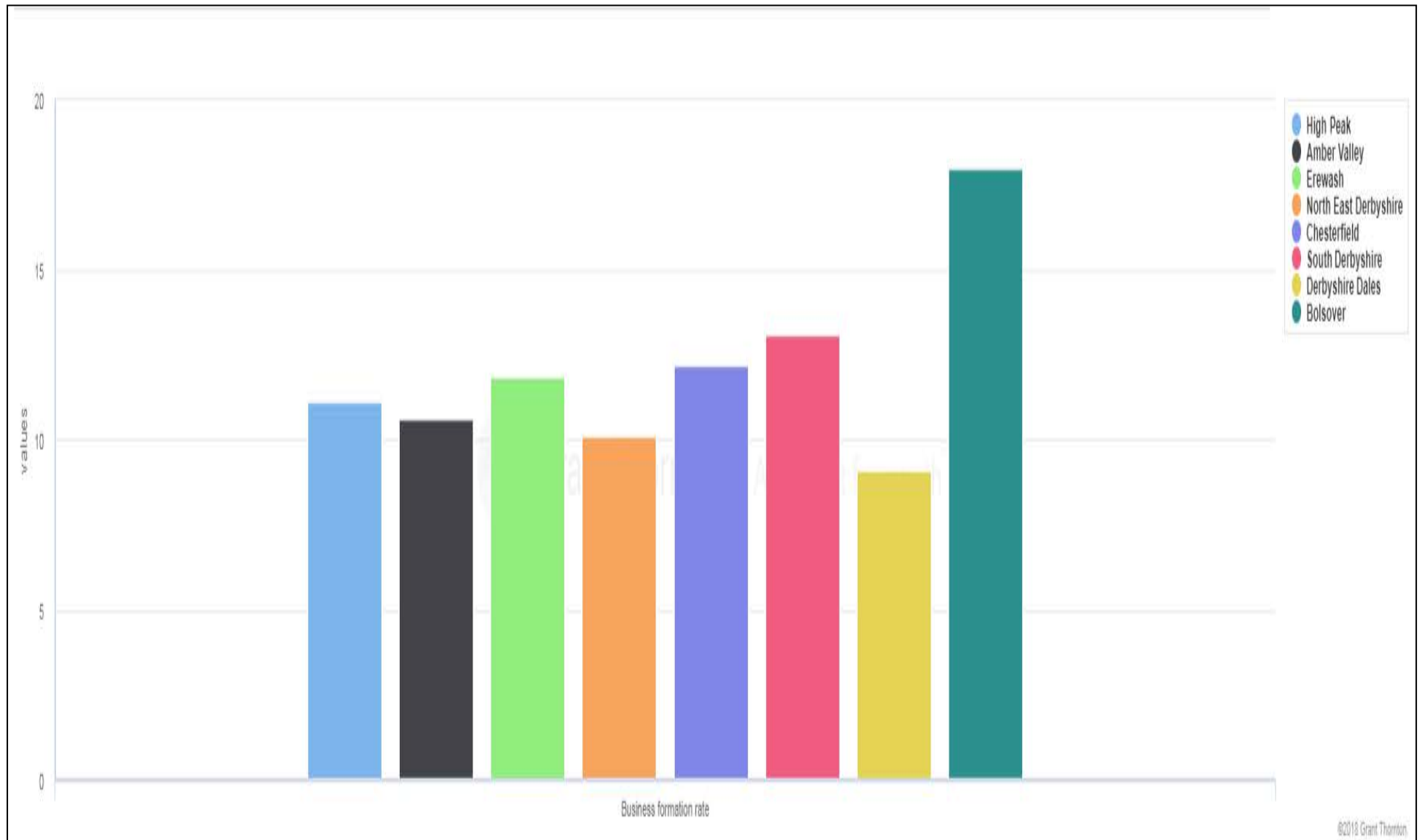
# Support Economic Development and Regeneration

This time series demonstrates changes in business formation rate from 2010-2016. The rate of new businesses as a proportion of total business stock has increased from 9.03% in 2010 to in 11.1% in 2016.

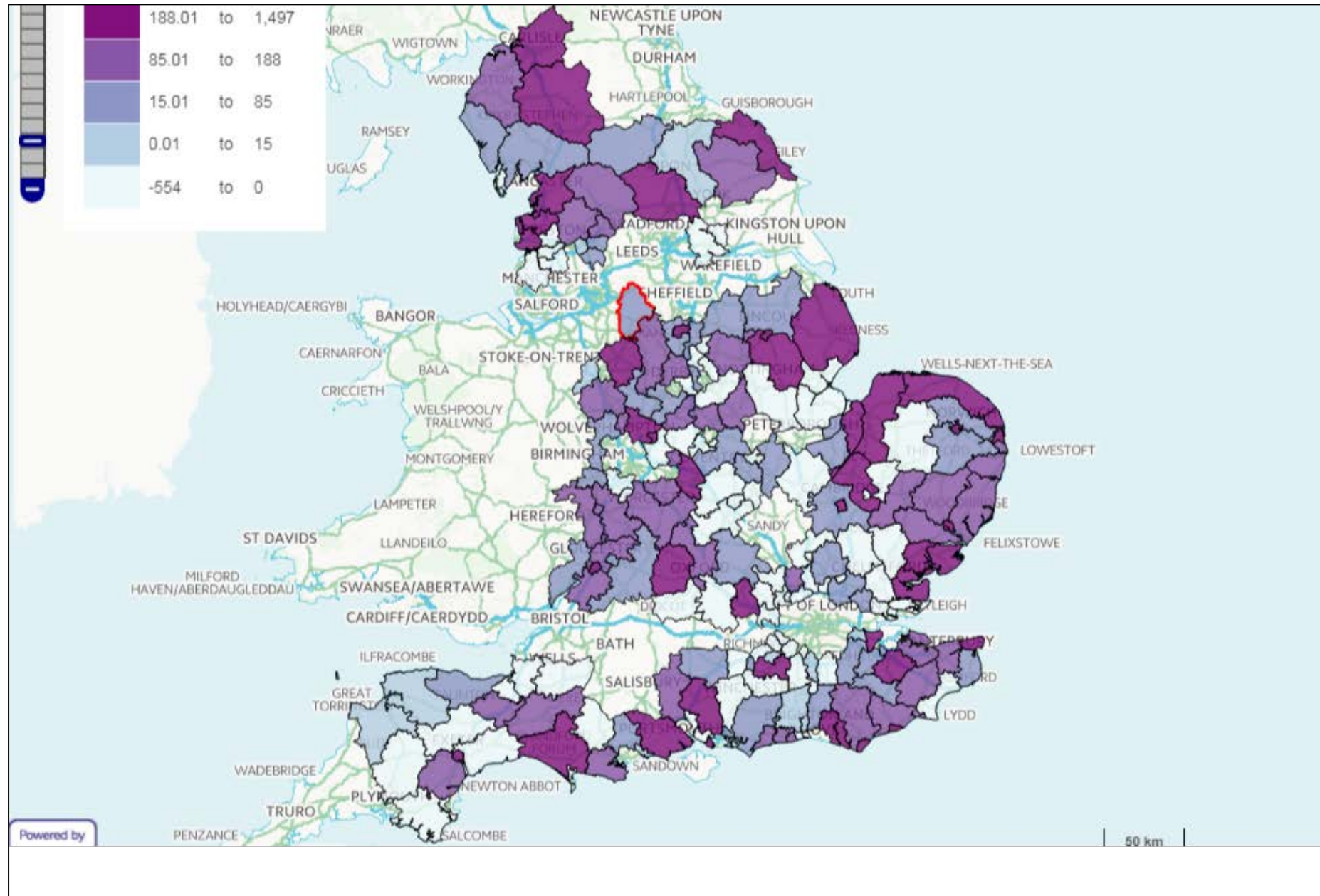


This bar chart shows the High Peak new business formation rate % for 2016 compared to other authorities in the area.



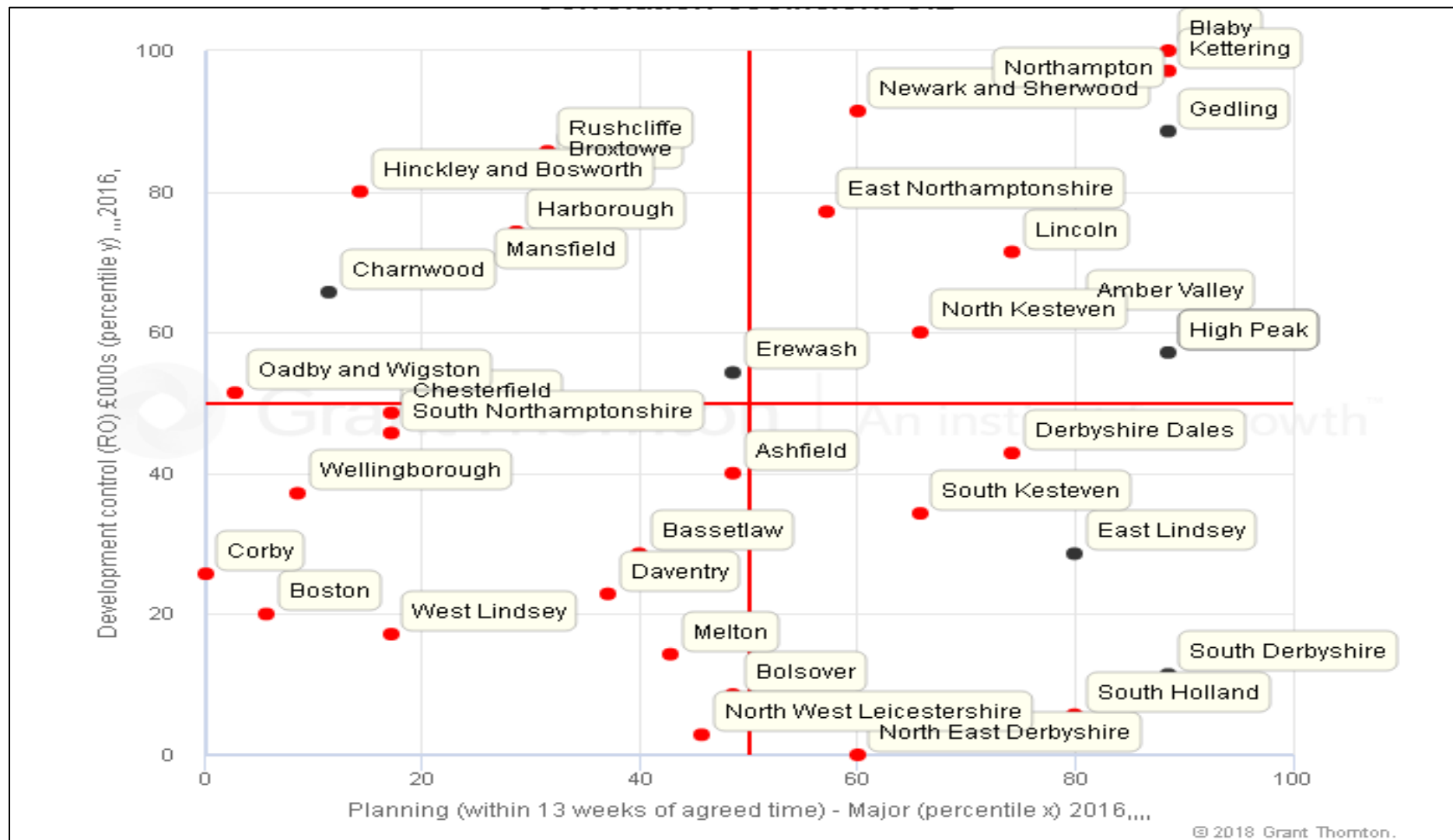
## Promote tourism

This map shows the total spend on tourism (RO, £000's 2016-17) across all English districts. High Peak sits in the middle quintile of districts nationally, spending £47,000 on tourism.

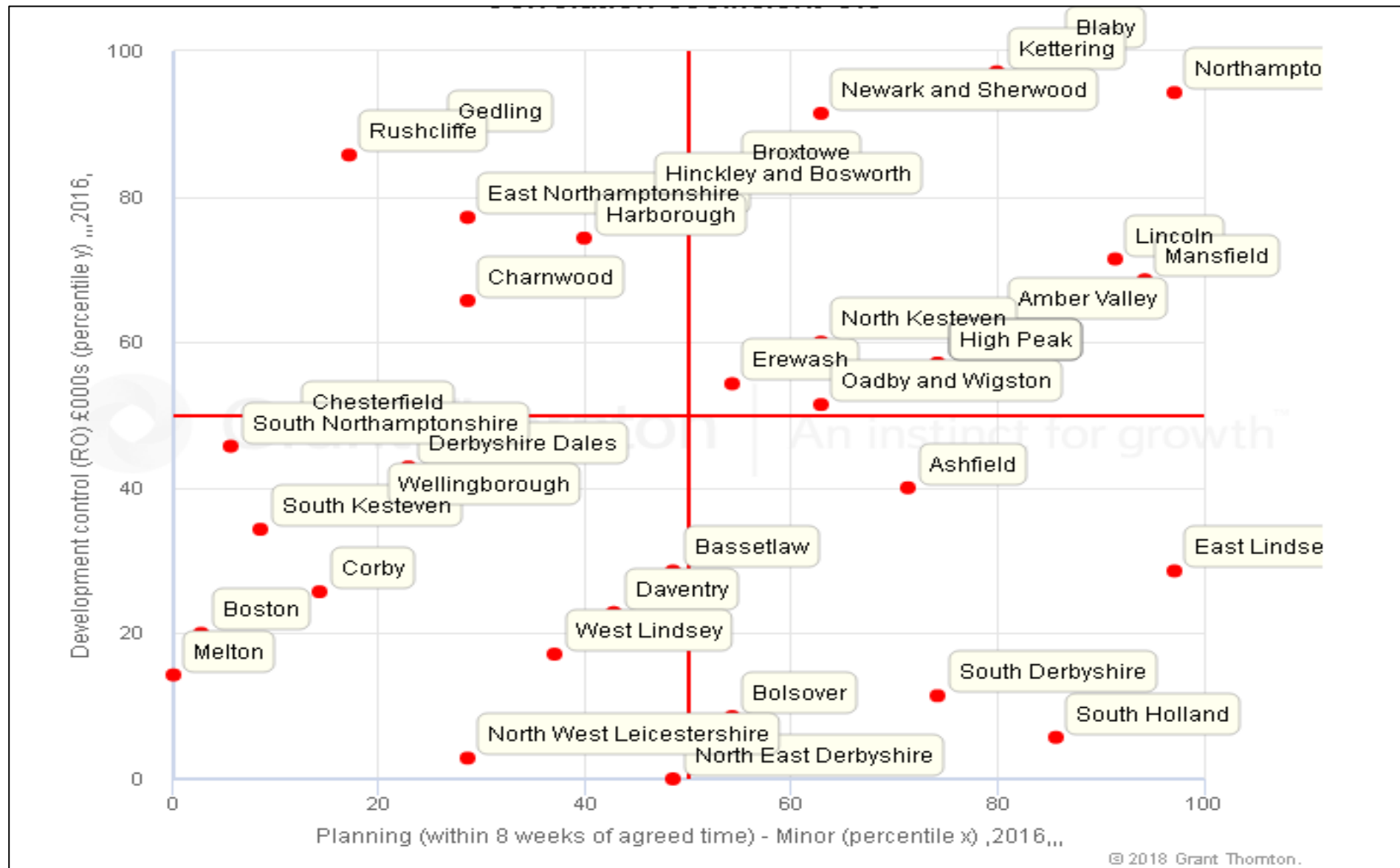


## High quality development and building control with an 'open for business' approach

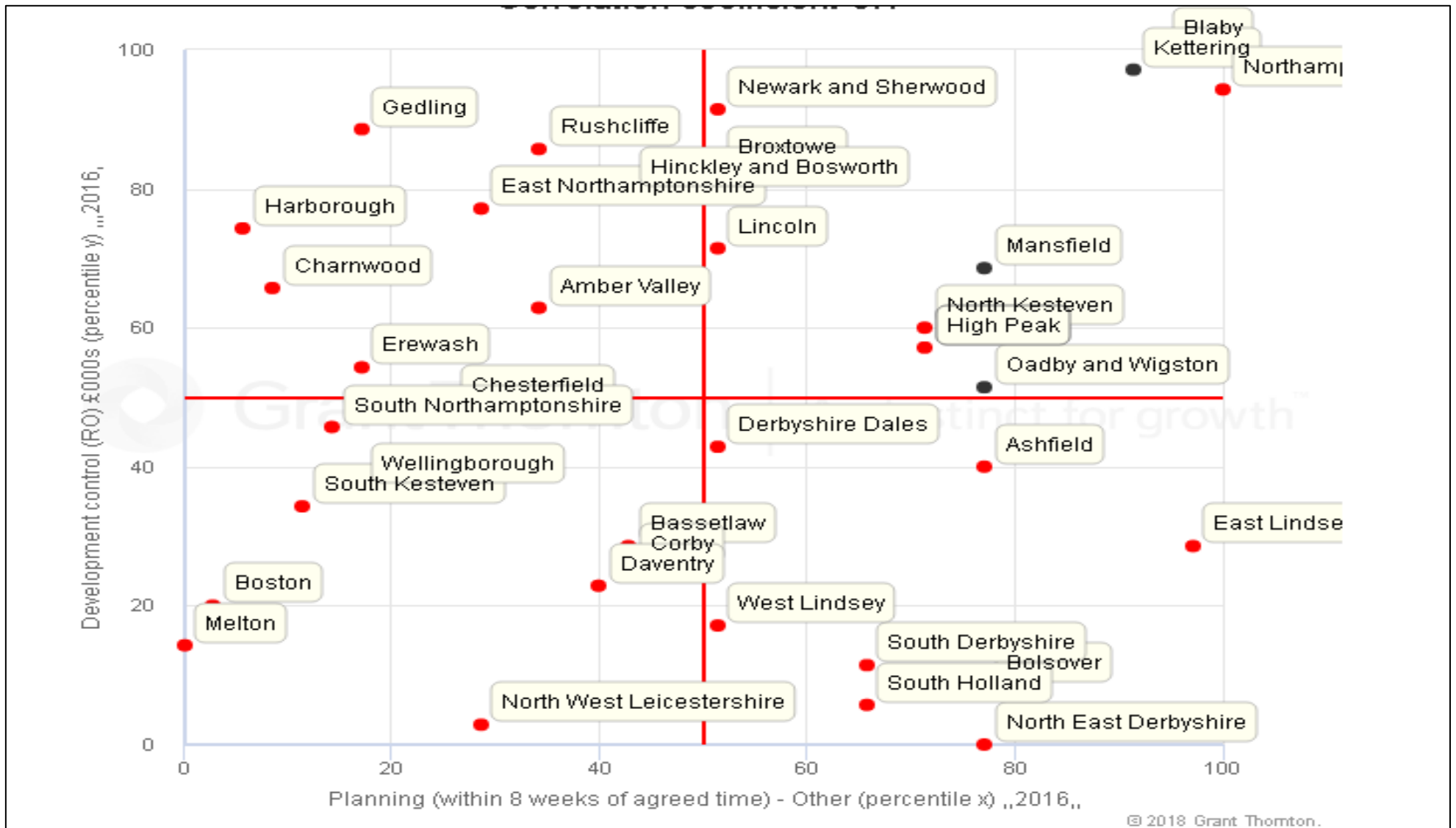
This chart shows the correlation between the cost of development control and major application processing within 13 weeks compared with the East Midlands Non-Metropolitan Group. In 2016-17, High Peak processed 100% of applications within target times, an improvement from 93% in 2015-16. Costs are 16<sup>th</sup> highest in the group, an improvement from 8<sup>th</sup> highest last year. South Derbyshire has a similar processing time but lower spend.



This chart shows the correlation between the cost of development control and minor application processing within 8 weeks compared with group for the same period. In 2016-17, High Peak processed 93% of applications within target times, an improvement from 83% in 2015-16. South Holland and East Lindsey for example are processing more applications to target at a lower cost.



This chart shows the correlation between the cost of development control and 'other' application processing within 8 weeks compared with the East Midlands group. In 2016-17, High Peak processed 96% of applications within target times, an improvement from 79% in 2015-16. Oadby and Wigton, Ashfield and East Lindsay for example are processing more to target at a lower cost.



The map below shows the spend on development control (RO, 2016-17) across all English districts. High Peak spent £302,000 on development control, sitting in the bottom 40% of districts nationally.
